The Parish Council (PC) did not have a full meeting in April due to the Annual Parish Meeting. However, a Special Meeting was called on 16 April to agree the co-option of Mark Freeman to the vacant Parish Councillor position.

Mark moved to Upper Froyle with his fiancée, Laura. He values the strong sense of community that a small rural village fosters. Mark is keen to support activities that promote and protect these traditions for the future through his work on the PC.

The Annual Parish Meeting (APM) was held on 16 April. This meeting was well attended by about 50 residents including some new to the village. Reports were presented by the Village Hall Committee and PC on their activity and finances and by our County Councillor (Mark Kemp-Gee).

Julie Southern reviewed the PC activities through the year which saw a return to more routine matters such as public area maintenance, trees and hedge cutting, and working with landowners on ditch clearance after the focus in recent years on the building of the Pavilion. Thanks were expressed to all Parish Councillors and residents who have unstintingly given their time to ensure that the quality of communications to residents is improved, the Rec is mown, trees are planted and maintained, the Village Magazine continues to be produced and many more.

A footpath map of the village is to be placed on the wall of the Pavilion funded in part by a grant from our EHDC District Councillor (Tony Costigan). Unfortunately, Tony was unable to attend and to provide an update on the allocation of new houses to be built in and around Alton.

Carrie Marshall gave a presentation on some of the ideas being considered by the PC to develop the Rec with more facilities for the community. Ideas include upgrading the playground and providing mobility equipment; sports facilities including an all-weather path around the perimeter of the Rec; provision of allotments if there is sufficient demand and land can be identified. These ideas will be further developed and a consultation held with residents later in the year before any commitments are made.

The meeting ended with an opportunity for all attendees to raise questions.

Mark Kemp-Gee provided an update on County Council matters relevant to Froyle.

The litter along the verge of the A31 from Veolia's operations has been cleared thanks to representations to EHDC and Highways by Mark, the PC and Froyle residents. Mark is now actively seeking ways to ensure that Veolia take responsibility for the cost of clearing up their mess and not leave this as another bill for EHDC and Highways to foot.

Mark continued with an impassioned review of the Government's proposals to create a Strategic Combined Authority (SCA) which will cover the IoW, Portsmouth, Southampton and the rest of Hampshire. In addition to the SCA, the Government has announced the creation of a number of Unitary Authorities (UA) to replace Hampshire County Council and all the District Councils including East Hampshire. This is a major change to the governance of our county as all activity previously carried out by the County or District Councils including roads, waste, planning and many more will be transferred to one of the new UA. In one fell swoop this local government reorganisation sadly removes Winchester as the historical centre of governance for Hampshire where it has been positioned for centuries.

The County Council elections scheduled for May 2025 have been cancelled. Existing Councillors will remain in seat. Elections are now planned for May 2026 at the same time as the election of the Mayor for the new SCA.

Discussions are ongoing with the Government over how many UAs will be created. Each UA must be self-financing and have a population of over 500,000. It is expected that at least two will be created away from the south coast. Discussions are ongoing to determine the geographical area to be covered by each UA. It is not known at present which of these new UA Froyle will fall under. It is important that all residents consider the proposals for the composition of the UA and submit views when consulted. The PC will advise residents of developments as information becomes available.

Finally, Mark provided insights into other County Council matters including the impact of being obliged to spend 70% of the County budget on funding adult and children's social care. As a result, the County Council has extremely limiting funding available for other services to residents such as repairing potholes to an acceptable standard, traffic calming initiatives etc. Thanks were expressed to Mark for all the work that he undertakes on behalf of the village.

The next PC meeting is on Monday 12 May at 19.00 in the Village Hall to which all residents are invited. This will be the PC's Annual General Meeting where the Chair and Deputy Chair for the coming year will be appointed, and the annual accounts approved.

The Village Hall Annual General Meeting (AGM) was again held in conjunction with the Annual Parish Meeting (APM) on 16 April. Approximately 50 residents attended together with Cllr Mark Kemp Gee.

The Village Hall 2024 accounts were adopted unanimously. Julie Southern proposing and Gordon Mitchell seconding. Thanks go to our Treasurer Charlie Findlay for great attention to detail and Ian Macnabb whose inspection is very helpful. Charlie reported a loss of £3,714 resulting largely from the unexpected cost of repairing the timbers at the front of the building and the late receipt of the Fete contribution. The intention is to break even annually. The Hall income increased by 18% to £10,897, a result of an increase in charges in March 2024, including introducing higher rates for weekend and commercial hires, and a shift from village groups to more weekend parties and commercial hires. The increasing cost of gas remains a significant concern.

Chairman, David Robertson paid tribute to our housekeeper Cindy Dennis who retired during the year and welcomed Marzena Tralewska.

David gave a brief review of the main events of 2024 including the Art Fair, another successful Safari Supper and the return of the much-missed Bonfire Night Party. During the year the Hall had been redecorated and the WiFi system boosted so that electronic payments can be taken across the recreation ground during the Fete, Open Gardens and car boot sales. More recently a new Hall sign had been installed and the curtains had been refurbished thanks to the work of Katie Lowen.

David emphasised that it was important to increase the use of the hall and that the committee would continue to support startups and new ventures.

David confirmed that after nine busy years he was standing down as Chair. His place is to be taken by Gillian Paul who had recently been elected by the Committee. He wished Gillian and the Committee all the best for the future.

Responding to comments from the floor, the Committee recognised that the pattern of usage was changing, few village groups and more out of village parties, and that increasing usage was a priority for the future.

The two containers are owned by the Hall and the Fete and had been publicly funded. While they are not beautiful, they provide essential cost-effective storage. It might be possible to repaint them or grow plants over them, but any form of cladding is not an option.

The Committee noted that parking must be a consideration in the event of increased use of the Hall.

The Committee will consider the request by the Pilates Group for additional cleaning in places they can see from a horizontal position but others can't!

The Committee then stood down. All those having agreed to continue to serve, were re-elected unanimously. Andrew Aldridge proposed, and Katie Snowball seconded.

Charlie Findlay spoke to Project 'Raising the Roof'. Reconstructing the roof would enable the Hall to be vaulted and allow for a greater variety of activities to take place. Removing the existing hips would greatly increase the surface area for more efficient modern solar panels. Storage batteries and the installation of a ground source/air heat pump might enable the Committee eventually to replace the gas boiler which is becoming increasingly expensive to run. Engineering plans have been acquired, and the Committee will now seek quotations. Full community consultation will be essential as the project moves forward.

From the floor William Knowles thanked David and Susie Robertson for their long service and presented them with an original landscape painting of Lower Froyle by David Burns.

The AGM was followed by the APM., reported on at pages 1-2.

STOP PRESS

The Spanish Holiday Club for children has been a great success over the last two weeks with many children attending, clearly having fun and learning Spanish. We hope more bookings will follow.

The NHS is coming to the Hall on 30 April. This is a free event open to all residents, aimed at making various health and wellbeing services more accessible to the local community particularly in rural areas. Many years ago the Hall hosted a doctor's surgery once a week. Many residents found this very helpful and regretted its loss.

Perhaps the tide is turning. We are very happy to support this venture.

A Tribute in Yarn: Handmade Poppies Adorn a Spitfire for the 80th Anniversary of VE Day

As a commemorative display to mark the 80th anniversary of Victory in Europe (VE) Day the crochet group have softened the sleek silhouette of the iconic Spitfire and made it poignant with an array of vibrant red poppies. This display which hangs from the ceiling of the Froyle Village Hall brings together craft and history, transforming a legendary aircraft into a moving canvas of remembrance.

The red poppy has long been a symbol of tribute to the fallen—those who served and sacrificed in the pursuit of peace during World War II. In this display, every crocheted bloom holds more than just symbolic weight; it carries the time, effort, and emotion of its maker. Some were stitched in silence. Others were created while sharing stories, reflecting on family histories, or simply as a gesture of gratitude to those who came before.

The Spitfire itself is an enduring icon of wartime bravery. Its role in defending Britain during the Battle of Britain and across Europe has etched it into the national memory. This project is more than a tribute—it is a communal act of remembrance. The crochet group, composed of people of all ages and backgrounds, came together over weeks and months to contribute their skills and hearts to this endeavour.

As visitors gather to reflect on the 80 years since the guns fell silent in Europe, this Spitfire—cloaked in poppies—stands as a testament to the enduring spirit of remembrance. Through craft, community, and care, we remember. We honour. And we promise never to forget.

May from the Potting Shed

Last year it was all about the wet, this year its about the dry. The Joy of Gardening!!

Froyle Gardening Club

Hopefully the rain has come in time to get the crops moving again. It will have helped get the seedlings and young plants to establish

better. Watering never seems as good as a pleasing shower of rain. Keep an eye on newly planted shrubs and herbaceous plants. They may need the odd watering can of water to get down to the roots. Using a sprinkler is not the best around newly planted items, a good soak is better.

May is the time to do the Chelsea Chop. About the 3 rd week in May you cut the tall late flowering herbaceous plants back by half to save you having to stake them. They will make more flowers though they will flower a little later. If the fear of frost is over tender bedding can be planted towards the end of the month.

Lawns that had moss control applied may need an additional top up. The dry spell would not have been as effective at controlling the moss. Make sure the ground is moist before applying.

I hope you will continue to do the 'No Mow May' on your lawns. It will help strengthen the grass as well as giving pollinating insects with a good supply of useful flowers. One thing I have noticed this spring is the number of wasps. This looks like it could be a big year for them after several years of decline, well certainly in my garden. Wasps are good in the garden as they feed on lots of pests such as aphids and caterpillars. It is only in the autumn when they become a nuisance.

If you are wanting to prune shrubs always look out for any birds nests in the trees, shrubs, climbers and hedges that you wish to do the pruning on. Leave the nests alone and do any pruning until after July/August when hopefully the young will have fledged.

Please don't forget the Gardening Club plant sales when you are pricking out or taking cuttings and save a few extra so that you can contribute to the plant sales at the Froyle Open Gardens and the Fête plant stall.

No Mow May

Do one action to help wildlife and the perfect way to start is by supporting nature in your garden (in May and beyond!).

Free the wildflowers in your lawn so they can grow and provide a feast for pollinators, for more information see Plantlife https://www.plantlife.org.uk/campaigns/nomowmay/.

Rest your mower over the month of May to provide a much-needed boost for wildlife throughout the summer.

You can choose not to mow some or all of your green space. Smaller plants such as daisies, buttercups, clover and dandelion, will get a chance to flower, providing a butterfly and bee buffet. You can continue to mow less and at different heights and frequencies through the summer to benefit our local wildlife.

It goes without saying that, if we want to help wildlife, we should avoid using lawn herbicides and pesticides in the garden. Maybe go a step further and plan to create a new wildflower meadow from seed. this autumn



Plantlife say that since the 1930s, 97% of flower-rich meadows have been lost with their vital habitat. A healthy lawn with some longer grass and wildflowers helps to tackle pollution, benefits wildlife and can even lock away carbon below the ground.



There are more than 20 million gardens in the UK. Even the smallest grassy patches add up and deliver enormous gains for nature, people and the climate. No Mow May is the perfect starting point for summer and leaving a mix of grass lengths in your lawn in May and through

the summer means you're giving nature the boost it deserves. Into June and beyond, this is the perfect time to manage your garden for nature all year round. In Froyle, the meadow surrounding the wildlife pond near Gid Lane has a variety of wildflowers that benefit pollinators throughout the seasons. For example, this year celandines and cowslips thrived in March and April. In May, they will be followed by ragged robin.

Dawn Chorus Day

Get out in the morning to hear nature's wonderful symphony! This year's Dawn Chorus Day is Sunday 5th May, see https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/dawn-chorus-day.

Rise early to revel in the sweet sound of birdsong; from wrens, blackbirds, song thrush, chiffchaffs and robins. The return of swifts in May to their nesting sites is one of those uplifting sights: we are especially fortunate to have some in Froyle.

Big Garden Birdwatch results 2025

Now in its 46th year, the Birdwatch provides a fascinating snapshot of how garden birds are faring. The RSPB reported that 512,372 nature lovers took part in the Birdwatch this year, spotting a phenomenal 7,667,456 birds.

Perched in top spot nationally for the 22nd year running was the chirpy house sparrow. However, numbers of house sparrows have declined by 12% in England since last year and have dropped to third place in Hampshire, behind first place blue tit and second place woodpigeon.

LENT LUNCHES 2025





Froyle Speed Watch – regular speeders

We've reported in previous editions that each week ,details of vehicles exceeding the published speed limit as they pass the speed cameras located in Froyle are reported to the Police. Details include the make, model, colour, and registration number of the offending vehicle. The report also highlights any vehicle caught which does not have a valid MOT and/or Road Tax. For GDPR reasons, we are prohibited from publishing the identity of these vehicles, specifically the registration number.

To give you a sense of the scale of the problem, the Speedwatch team have analysed the number of vehicles that were caught speeding through the village between mid-March and mid-April. Those that exceeded the limit during the period 5 or more times are given below, along with the maximum speed logged

It is interesting to note from this information that, contrary to many comments heard from residents, the majority of persistent speeders are not white van or delivery drivers (though they are well represented) but drivers of passenger cars – are you one of them?

Please be advised that the data provided to the police includes a "heat map" of the times that vehicles are caught speeding. We are working with the Police to arrange for an officer to attend with a speed gun when these heat maps show the most persistent offenders are likely to pass through the village.

Whether you recognise one of these vehicles or not please ensure that when driving through the village **you** always drive safely at a speed that is appropriate for the road and weather conditions and do not exceed the speed limit.

We will provide further updates later in the year.

Successfully Installing an Air Source Heat Pump in an Old Cottage - my experience

Air source heat pumps (ASHPs) are an increasingly popular way to heat homes efficiently. They work by extracting heat from the outside air, even in cold temperatures, and using it to warm up your home and provide hot water. While they are commonly associated with modern, well-insulated buildings, with the right planning, they can also be a great option for older properties .

We recently installed an air source heat pump in our cottage on Park Lane in Lower Froyle. Built in 1900, our home presented some challenges that might make it seem like an unlikely candidate for a heat pump. The house has single glazing throughout, uninsulated floors, and solid walls in half of the building. The rest, built in the 1980s has limited insulation too. However, we wanted to move away from fossil fuels and reduce our running costs and were keen to see if an ASHP could work for us. Given I work in this industry it was time to put my money where my mouth was!

One of the biggest misconceptions about installing a heat pump in an old home, beyond massively improving the building insulation levels, is that you need to replace all the pipework and plumbing. Very rarely is this the case and nor did we need to do this, though we did decide to upgrade some of the radiators to modern, more efficient models to tidy the look of the house up a bit. Additionally, we ensured that our loft insulation was topped up to modern standards to reduce heat loss and make the system as effective as possible.

The heat pump installation process took just a few days. The hot water cylinder was fitted in the loft, and the fan unit was positioned discreetly at the back of the house. Out of sight and out of mind and the unit operates with minimal noise.

One of the key incentives for switching to an air source heat pump was the financial support available. We applied for the Boiler Upgrade Scheme (BUS) grant, which provided us with £7,500 towards the cost. Our installer handled the paperwork, making the process hassle-free. Unlike some heat pump systems that require a gas boiler backup, our unit is fully electric, meaning we were able to remove the old gas boiler completely and now only use gas for cooking.

Since switching to an air source heat pump, our total home energy costs have reduced by about 35% compared to last year (with the help of Octopus energy's smart tariffs) and we will have saved the cost of the total heat pump installation in less than 3 years. Beyond the cost savings, the energy efficiency rating of our home has improved, adding value to the property. Most importantly, we've been warm and comfortable throughout

the winter, proving that a heat pump can work well even in a 124-year-old uninsulated cottage.

This is actually the second time we've installed a heat pump in a house over 100 years old, and our experiences have shown that many of the concerns people have about heat pumps in older buildings are based on myths rather than facts. With careful planning and the right advice, they can be an excellent heating solution, even in traditionally built homes.

If you're considering making the switch and have any questions, we'd be happy to share our experience and even show you around our home. Feel free to get in touch—we believe more people should consider this option for a greener, more cost-effective way to heat their homes.

THE VIEW FROM THE VICARAGE

What is your picture of God? The answer to this simple question has incredibly profound consequences. For some people, God is summed up in the phrase, "Gentle Jesus, meek and mild". A "fluffy bunny" God who is kind to people, but who is powerless in the face of injustice, cruelty or war. For others, he is a cosmic policeman with universal CCTV, who sees all the mistakes we make and has a never-lengthening list of all we have done wrong. Another common view is that God is egotistical and is only happy if we worship him. We end up with pictures of God that portray him as powerless, judgemental or selfish. The response then is often of unbelief. I know a Christian who asks people to describe the God they don't believe in and surprises people by saying "I don't believe in that God either!"

In my first job, I worked in a hostel for young homeless people in London, working with social workers and healthcare professionals to help them to begin to live independently in their own homes. One day, one of my clients, a 17 year old girl, came to ask me to sort something out with her social worker. She was someone with a lot of issues, a very disrupted family life and living under huge pressures. While I was on the phone to the social worker, she picked up a pen and starting writing on a pad on my desk. We managed to sort out the misunderstanding and agree on the next best step for her. When she left, I remembered that she had been doodling and I picked up the pad. Within a circle of flowers with petals she had written, "Don't judge me until you can love me."

As humans we are so quick to judge. They are not my kind of people. Someone who speaks like that isn't intelligent. I wouldn't want them living next to me. They are all the same. The list of snap judgements goes on and on. But this girl taught me, I don't have the liberty to make judgements about individuals, until I have done the hard work of seeking to love them first. The same goes for God. Our kneejerk descriptions of what God might be like, have to be constantly open to revision. Even as a Vicar, I need to constantly check to see if the God I describe in sermons and in print, is the God revealed in the Bible and particularly through Jesus.

The God of the Bible is pure love. "God is love. Those who live in love, live in God." 1 John 4:16. This verse challenges me about the quality of my own love, am I loving like God does? Or is my love selfish, egotistical, thin skinned? If my love is fully rounded, and embracing of all, keeping no record of wrongs done and forgiving much, then I might be part of the way there.

Jesus is radical in his love. He has no regard for his reputation when making friends of criminals, prostitutes, lepers, and those who count themselves out. "God couldn't love

He calls his followers to love their enemies and prays for those hammering nails into his cross, "Father, forgive them, they do not know what they are doing." This God is passionate, risk-taking, utterly committed to seeking out those who know the mistakes they have made and are at risk of settling for a half-life or existence.

His message is instead, Follow me and "I will give you life in all its fullness." John 10:10




two-hour session of ballroom and Latin dancing.
